Message from the State Chaplain

With the call to grow spiritually, I again offer two points this month that I believe will help each of us, as members of the Knights of Columbus, grow in our faith and commitment to the Order.

Unity in Fraternity: If we do not have unity we will not have fraternity. What a joy when a Knight discovers that he belongs to an organization of like-minded men. He will come to know these men as his brothers and friends. Brothers are there for one another, they support one another, and hopefully they reach a point of not only encouraging one another but even challenging one another when necessary—but in a fraternal way. It is regrettable but true that sometimes tensions rise, an unkind word is spoken, or a disagreement lingers. Scripture has dramatic examples of tension, even among brothers (e.g. Joseph sold into slavery by his brothers), but they are fortunately the exception. It seems Peter and Paul didn't always see eye-to-eye, but in their ultimate witness and service Peter and Paul were truly brothers, and so linked together in preaching the Gospel. Jesus tells us, "if your brother has anything against you, leave your gift at the altar, go first and be reconciled," (Mt. 5: 23-24) and that we should forgive our brother "seventy times seven" times (Mt. 18: 21-22). May we find the strength in our brother Jesus to build a life-changing fraternity among the Knights.

Lessons of Loaves and Fish: The Gospel account of the multiplication of the loaves and fish to feed the multitudes is a powerful example of the Lord's power over nature, and His ultimate feeding the world for all time. 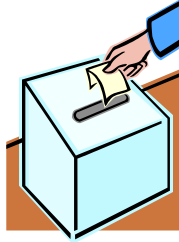

Annual Spring Mulch Sale 2014

On Saturday, April 5, 2014, the Columbia Council very successfully completed a Spring Fundraiser, for the benefit of the Council. After soliciting yard-mulch orders from new and former customers by email, phone, postal mail and tables at the weekend masses for parts of February and all of March, two (2) big trucks of bagged regular and black mulch were delivered at 6 AM to the eastern side of the Wilde Lake Interfaith Center parking lot. As loaders arrived, the first rental truck went out by 8 AM. Additional loads were delivered by brother knights using their own vans and pickup trucks. Most of the loads were distributed to customers by 2 PM, leaving a clean parking lot. A few additional bags were sold and/or distributed later. The activity in the parking lot attracted the attention of passers-by, some of whom purchased bags, and all of whom added contact information to the database for the 2015 Mulch Drive. Many Brother Knights participated in the work. Various knights worked long and hard with the solicitation of orders, the bookkeeping of the orders and funds, the generation of travel maps for the use of the drivers, and the support of drivers and loaders with food and drink. Many brothers showed up on Saturday morning, some with teenage sons, to load the mulch, to drive trucks and vans, and to unload the trucks or vans at the customers' driveways. Boy Scouts from a local troop helped with the loading of mulch bags. The work of so many Brother Knights contributed to the success of this Council Activity.

The 5th Annual St. Patrick's Day celebration was held on Saturday, March 22, 2014 at the Wilde Lake Interfaith Center. A total of \$2700 was raised that will be used towards a medical waste incinerator at the Malowa Medical dispensary.

A total of 205 tickets were sold and 160 people attended the event. The council received 10% (\$300) of the net proceeds earned. Music was provided by Dileab Phriseal and Tanzanian Ceili Band and the Broeshler School of Irish Dance provided a wonderful dance performance. An amazing selection of craft beers were graciously donated by Cross Street Irregulars and Maryland Home Brew – thank you!!

Also, special thanks to Fr. Gerry Bowen and Fr. Gene Nickol for their generous contributions of \$500 each to TCP.
